National Trust locally, what's happening? The Trust's properties remain closed, as we know, but there are beautiful open parklands readily accessible, close to Oxford. Parking is often limited so visitors are asked to return another time if all spaces are taken, and to avoid parking on the verges. For instance:

- Ashridge Estates** and **Badbury Common** car parks are open.
- Buscot Village**: please - no parking on grass verges, in front of houses and driveways; take litter home.
- The Coombes, Hinton Parva site** supports 23 different butterfly species as well as rare wildflowers

- White Horse Hill** pay-and-display car park offers free parking for National Trust members with a valid membership card (scan on the machine to receive your parking ticket) and disabled badge carriers

Oxford Centre has, for over 50 years, been working hard “.. to promote and prosper the work of the National Trust”. Arguably, our support is more than ever needed this year. What can we do?

Donations to The Trust At the end of 2019 we were able to donate £5,000 to projects at 7 local properties: we gave funds toward restoring the summer house at Nuffield Place, providing an accessibility buggy at Greys Court, and installing lighting in Coleshill Mill. At the end of this year we hope to support further projects in our region. Every member’s subscription contributes to the donations we are able to make. **You are making a difference - thank you.**

200 Club, an update This year’s remaining 3 prize draws in October, November and December will go ahead even if the lectures are cancelled, and prize cheques will be posted out. 16 prizes totalling £280 are yet to be awarded! (Total prize money in 2020 will amount to £475, and a donation of £560 will go to National Trust at the end of the year.) Many thanks to everyone who made this a bumper 200 Club year!

A new programme of visits? As you know, our programme of visits for the Summer months had to be cancelled. Depending on Government policy and guidance, we hope if at all possible to promote, by November, trips for Spring 2021. Like you, we are watching and waiting to see how and when venues and travel might become available again.

Winter Lecture Series Our lectures are due to start again on 20 October at Magdalen Auditorium with a fascinating story of *The Water Gypsy who became a Viscountess*, told by Julie Ann Godson. However, it remains to be seen whether the Auditorium will be open, and what any restriction on social distancing will mean for audiences. We will of course update our members, when we know the situation.

September holiday We are staying in close touch with those members who have booked for the planned Autumn holiday to Bournemouth and the surrounding area. We will take advice and make a final decision, latest mid-July, on whether or not this can go ahead or must be cancelled.

Oxford Centre’s Discussion Day, “Our Water Heritage – how much do we care?” was to be a special, celebratory event in September of this year to mark 2 important anniversaries: Oxford Centre’s recent 50th and the National Trust’s current 125th. It is now postponed to a date to be arranged sometime in 2021. From the outset it attracted broad interest from within the National Trust, amongst environmentalists and specialists in water management. We are greatly heartened that our speakers and key contacts are keen to stay in touch, hoping to participate next year.

Our members are making news! The latest issue of “*Group Travel Organiser*” features (page 30) in picture and in print our very own Nesta Jones and Marie Saunders, who attended the South West Group Travel Show held in Bristol in January. Whilst May’s “*Saga Magazine*” includes (pages 68-9) an article, “*I was there!*” in celebration of the 75th Anniversary of VE Day. OCNT member Mary Turton appears there, very appropriately, since she worked at Bletchley Park in WW2 and vividly recalls celebrating VE Day.

A newly-forming OCNT Walkers’ Group Eight members have expressed interest in the concept of organised walks of differing lengths (2-10 miles) from local NT properties.
